PASS Profile (Pupil Attitudes towards Self & School) was used at the beginning of the 10 week programme and again at the end. Although pupil attitudes remained below the expected result for most areas at the end of the programme, there was a significant improvement in their attitudes to both themselves and school, with an average increase of between 30 – 50% across all areas. There was an improvement in particular, when assessing attitudes to attendance, general work ethic and confidence in learning, where all pupil self-assessment were above the expected % score at the end of the programme. The Friends for Life programme has, thus far, proved to be effective at improving pupil's attitudes towards them self and school therefore we shall continue with this next academic year.

The APS for Reading was 10.1 points: expected is 13, putting pupils almost 3 APS below expected – this equates to almost 1 year. 100% of these pupils were assessed as at Phase 1 phonics. Spring 2; the end of the 20 week programme, 94% (15 pupils) were assessed as working within the 40-60 month band with 7% (1 pupil) in the 30-50 band. The APS at Spring 2 was 13.9 showing progress of almost 4 APS in Reading. This is above the expected 2 points at this time of the academic year. Pupils remain below expected in Reading however; the attainment gap has been narrowed by about a term. All pupils are now working within Phase 3 Phonics, therefore are on track to be working within Phase 4 by Summer 2 – on track. 16 Nursery Pupils Baseline at Spring 2, showed 68% of pupils Reading within the 30-50 (developing) band and 7% within the 22-36 month band. The APS for Reading was, on average, 10 points: expected was 11, putting pupils 1 APS below expected – this equates to 1 term. Summer 2; the end of the 10 week programme, 43% (7 pupils) were assessed as working within the 30-50 month band in the 'secure' range with 57% (9 pupils) in the 30-50 band within the 'developing' range. The APS at Summer 2 was, on average, 11 showing progress of 1 APS in Reading which is in line with expected progress. Pupils, however remain below the expected standard in Reading by 1 term.
